- Introduction
- Greenway Improvements Lisa Middag, Hennepin County Midtown Community
   Works
  - Increasing signage along Greenway
    - Identifying access points to Greenway
  - New green spaces along Greenway
  - Main issues: areas where Greenway wasn't well connected to rest of city; "Gap"
     between Greenway and street grid
    - Not enough signs
    - People getting lost on Greenway
  - Advocating for better wayfinding tools on Greenway
  - Concerns over safety of bikers getting on/off Greenway
  - How can we make the communities around Greenway feel more connected to the Greenway
    - Making it more accessible to different demographics
      - Partnering with community/neighborhood organizations to make
         Greenway space more welcoming/representative to minority
         communities along Greenway

- Working on Art Place grant application making Greenway more culturally representative through murals etc. (main applicant would most likely be Midtown Greenway Coalition)
- Murals approved already for Phillips neighborhood
- Whittier Alliance: Potential grant partnership
  - Resources could be directed to bridge on Nicollet
  - Signage on Eat Street
  - Reaching out to renters to involve certain communities more and spread knowledge of Greenway
  - Define what resources/involvement the Alliance would want to ask for in grant partnership
  - Future projects?
    - Developing Kmart "plaza" would connect Greenway and excluded communities more?
    - "The corridor" is owned by rail authorities and is protected historically
    - Opening up the trench of the Greenway to street level would help connect it to the communities nearby
      - Making traditionally marginalized groups feel safer when
         on the Greenway by making it more open
    - Using history of art, diversity, and proximity to the Greenway to our advantage in the future
    - What short-term/non-permanent inclusive art projects in Whittier can we implement?

- Art made by the community for the community
- A piece of art that promotes representation and inclusiveness in the neighborhood
- Greenway entrance on Nicollet should be more connected to surroundings/more welcoming to promote usage
- Art could be used to physically connect greenway to rest of the neighborhood while simultaneously encouraging cultural diversity in Whittier
- Pre-application due in January for grant
- Presentation Planning Emanual, Willow, Kaley
  - Volunteer Appreciation/Business Association mixer at Wedge table friday 12/2
  - Showcasing what ESTF has done in the past year
  - Hoping to draw in people who are interested in environmental sustainability to bolstering ESTF for the future
    - Recruiting people who haven't volunteered in Whittier before
  - Community input on future projects (provide way to measure what projects community members would be interested in)
    - Community solar
    - Rain gardens
    - Biking/walking equity
  - Get feedback on how to better engage community
    - Making task force more accessible to more people
      - More variety of meeting times?
    - Business presence at task force meetings
